# The Authors




**W**E HAVE KNOWN George and Elsbeth Muller for quite a few years. In fact, from 'way back when skate dancing was only considered to be an amusing pastime on both ice and rollers in these United States . . . long before folks had come to agree upon which dances might be skated in competitions.

But even then the Mullers were already "a name" in skate dancing. They were recognized composers of merit. People were skating their dances in many places — "The Missouri Dance," "Boston Ten-Step" and others.

The Mullers came to the United States from Germany. They had skated for years in the old world as outstanding amateurs and after becoming professionals had turned essentially toward the teaching field. In addition to the United States and Germany, they have skated in Austria, Belgium, Spain, England, Switzerland, Australia and Canada. They have taught at many famous skating clubs in this country, then as the field of ice dancing grew into a fascinating sport in 1935 and '36 they were drawn into the expanding orbit of the roller skating sport. Thereafter their activities were shared in the two mediums.

The years have passed and the file of skate dances has grown thick, composed by George and with his wife, Leah, on one hand and by Elsbeth on the other. All moods, all tempi, are represented in this file and at long last they have selected "their best" for this book. The selection required over twenty months time by George and Elsbeth before they permitted us to print.

A tribute to the Mullers for their wonderful compositions is the fact that many of their original dances are now included in ice and roller skating dance tests. Their dances are skated in many countries. So we can say without reservation that you are now opening these pages to more fun in skate dancing than ever before under the personal guidance of our greatest contemporary skate dance composers.



## TEMPII

In a number of cases, special notes have been given for certain dances describing the exact roller tempo.


## NOTE REGARDING THE DIAGRAMS

It should be explained that herein many of the dances bear symbols which until quite recently were used exclusively in this country (viz: I. O. F.) while there are many diagrams which bear the British type of symbols (viz: L. F. O.). It is hoped that the use of both methods in these diagrams will not create confusion. Skaters studying from this text should examine the diagrams at the outset and it will be found very simple to discern the method or symbol being used.

This dance should be skated to a Viennese waltz of medium speed. Racing by the dancers creates necessity to take shortcuts and flats. The character of the dance is then lost. In the mohawk as skated by both partners, the lady's right hand and man's left hand may be disengaged to a shoulders-in-line position, rejoining hands upon completion.



Steps 14 to 17 in closed position

On step 13 partners join left hands  
Lady turns under Man's left arm

On step 12 holding right hands only  
partners swing free leg in  
unison — Lady in back of Man

On steps 10 and 11 Lady turns  
under Man's right arm


On steps 7 and 7a partners







Originally composed to waltz time, this dance was designed for teams in formation dancing. Partners stand hand in hand and change sides on the inside Mohawk Turn. The skater who is nearest the barrier in one direction will find himself at the center of the rink when returning. This dance may also be skated in dance position like the Carnival Tango when omitting six steps to fit a smaller sized rink.

Step 8 LIF for the man and lady is better skated crossed forward (XF). For optional movement the lady, instead of changing edge on step 13 ROF, count 3-4-1-2 may use on count 1-2 an LIF-ROF close chasse and then proceed with step 14-LIF Choctaw to 15-ROB as in diagram. There is no change in steps for the man.

So named because it may be danced to either Fox-Trot or Waltz music. Lady's step number 8 LOF may be prolonged for two beats (4, 5) by executing a change edge without swing corresponding to the man's change and then using only a short step for 9-ROF of one beat (6). This then would be inside with man's 9 RIF.



The two opening steps (LOF, ROF) may be repeated at the end of each sequence as a part of the dance routine. This is optional and suggested for use on a large rink.



The Michigan was composed to be practice for a Kilian-type dance. It is always advisable to practice and study a dance in slow motion to be sure of the technique—meaning checking the shoulders to counteract turns of the skating foot—turning of the free leg from the hip at transitions from F to B and B to F and not the trunk of the body (pelvis) which is a very common fault. Two lobes with a choctaw have been added to this dance to make it more interesting and enjoyable.




The man's step number 15—LFO-3—may be replaced by a quick open mohawk (RFI-LBI) at the beginning of step number 15 thereby riding all three counts (4, 5, 6) on LBI as an optional movement. The lady's steps remain as in drawing.




With step 10 the couple returns to Kilian position (reversed).



This is a variation of the B Waltz, it has smaller lobes and deeper edges. Repeat the straight-away lobes to cover a larger surface.

Lady's counter (step 3) may be executed on BOTH feet. The two skates resting closely together on the surface momentarily.





Originally meant to be skated in open dance position only, however, the dance as skated in Kilian position is easier for the beginner. This dance should be studied for "roundness of edges"—avoiding shortcuts on flats, a fault which occurs too frequently in all skate dancing. Each lobe should be aimed at the barrier or the center of the rink respectively (not down-rink).




